#### Program: 1 Hour, 3 Rabbis, 3 Texts on Teshuvah



#### **Mussar Study**

We are very excited to be partnering with the Mussar Institute to offer a four-week course entitled, "A Taste of Mussar." Mussar is an age-old Jewish practice that seeks to refine character through study, reflection, and exercises focusing on ethical qualities (in Hebrew, *middot*), such as compassion, patience, forgiveness, etc. This course will be offered twice during the year: 11/28, 12/6, 12/13, and 12/20; and 3/28, 4/7, 4/14, and 4/21.

## The Leaders of the Reform Movement Come to TBE to Help Honor Arthur and Betty Roswell

Betty and Arthur Roswell are among the most important and influential leaders and philanthropists of the Reform Movement here and internationally, and of our local Jewish community. To recognize and thank them for all that they have done in more than 50 years of good works, we will be joined by **Rabbi Rick Jacobs**, President of the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ); **Rabbi Michael Marmur**, Provost of the Hebrew Union College–Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC–JIR); **Rabbi Dan Freelander**, President of the World Union for Progressive Judaism (WUPJ); and **Rabbi Gilad Kariv**, President of the Israel Movement for Reform and Progressive Judaism (IMPJ). These four great leaders will teach Torah during a special **Shabbat morning service on December 10**, which will be followed by a festive tribute luncheon.

The following day, **Sunday, December 11**, we will be joined by **Anat Hoffman**, the dynamic leader of the Israel Religious Action Center (IRAC) and Women of the Wall (WOW). One of Israel's great champions of justice and pluralism, Anat will challenge us to be the nation's partners in this sacred work. During this gathering, leaders of our local Jewish community from the Jewish Federation, JCC, JFS, and Rutgers Hillel will join us to pay tribute to Betty and Arthur.

#### 50th Anniversary of the Six-Day War with Hartman Scholars Yossi Klein Halevi and Yehuda Kurtzer

Join us to explore the impact and the legacy of the Six-Day War on Israel and the American Jewish community with two preeminent scholars on this topic. This two-part series is being brought to us through Jewish LIFE and the Shalom Hartman Institute. On **Thursday evening, March 16, Yossi Klein Halevi** will address the impact of the Six-Day War on Israel, and on **Thursday evening, April 20, Yehuda Kurtzer** will speak about the impact of war on American Jewry.

#### At Temple Beth-El, We Make Jews!

Hello, and happy September! I hope you've had a relaxing and fun-filled summer. My summer included a vacation in California, biking, kayaking and days at the beach. Somehow those delightful summer days always seem to fly by way too quickly.

Temple Beth–El goes on a bit of a vacation in the summer as well. While the staff and lay leaders are hard at work preparing for the upcoming year, the summer months are not jam–packed with classes and events; we only have Shabbat evening services, many of which are led by lay leaders. Thanks to all the dedicated volunteers who beautifully led our services over the summer. And who can forget IHN and the 4–H Fair? Many thanks to Fern Schiffman and all the volunteers who fried falafel and hawked lemonade, despite scorching heat, humidity and rain, and to Leigh Freeman and all the dedicated IHN volunteers.

So I asked Rabbi Gluck to state our temple's mission. Without missing a beat, he exclaimed, "To make Jews!" As a marketer, that really resonated with me. It was clear, concise and catchy. He captured it all in just three syllables. Rabbi Gluck went on to say that if Temple Beth-El were a business, our product would be Jews.

The late Rabbi Alexander Schindler once reminded us why synagogues are unique: "The synagogue is where Jews are made, where the individual soul and the community are joined. It is the place where modernity and eternity crossfertilize, where seeds of Jewish identity are sown. All other institutions in Jewish life are created by Jews. Only the synagogue creates Jews, child by child, family by family..."

At Temple Beth-El, we aim to nurture all our members with meaningful Jewish experiences. Sometimes we get to start with a newborn baby, a toddler or young child just beginning religious school. At Temple Beth-El, we firmly believe that teen engagement starts at birth. We also begin as early as possible in the life cycle to engage parents in the process of developing a long-term Jewish vision for their children. We ask them, "When your child goes off to college, what do you want them to know, feel and do, Jewishly?" Through the years, we engage in the sacred work of providing our children with rich and meaningful

experiences to strengthen their Jewish identity and prepare our young people for Jewish adulthood.

But enriching Jewish experiences and learning are not just for children at Temple Beth-El. As adults, we come to Temple Beth-El in many varieties. Some of us have had a lifetime filled with lewish education and experiences.

with Jewish education and experiences. Some of us are Jewish, but come to TBE with little to no Jewish education or knowledge. And some of us are not Jewish. Regardless of our background, each of us can find a sense of belonging, connection to others, opportunities to engage in acts of social justice and rich experiences of learning and spiritual growth at Temple Beth-El.

We have a tremendous lineup of adult education classes this year. We will offer two sessions in September designed to help us prepare to engage more deeply with several of the key prayers in the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur liturgy. We will also offer a class in *Mussar*, an introduction to the study and practice of Jewish spiritual ethics that will provide an opportunity to elevate our souls, grow into more sensitive, caring people, and connect more deeply with one another.

We also have some outstanding guest speakers this year. Just to give you a taste of what's to come, Anat Hoffman, Executive Director of the Israel Religious Action Center, and Hartman Scholar Yossi Klein Halevi, author of *Like Dreamers*, will once again delight us with their teaching. If you've heard them speak before, you know they are not to be missed. And if you haven't heard them speak, well, who says there's no such thing as a second chance?

This year we will provide a Temple Beth-El Program Guide so you will be able to see our entire lineup of wonderful adult education opportunities and guest speakers at a glance. It will be coming your way on Rosh Hashanah.

Over the years I have taken advantage of many adult education classes and opportunities for spiritual growth at Temple Beth-El. I came to TBE as a Jew with little Jewish education. Temple Beth-El is where I became a Jew, and for that I am tremendously grateful.

I look forward to learning, praying and engaging in acts of loving kindness with you this year.

In the coming year I will be co-teaching eighth grade in Confirmation Academy, leading meetings and programs with LTS (Leadership Training Seminar) and serving as the advisor for our senior youth group, SMOOCHY (Somerset Members Of Our Committed Hebrew Youth).

What is LTS? The Leadership Training Seminar is a program for all kids in grades 9 to 12 who want to further develop their leadership skills and experience being a leader within their Jewish community. During this twice-a-month commitment, teen leaders will meet regularly to plan and run programs for other students.

Sam Radowitz is a senior at Hillsborough High School and a member of our SMOOCHY Board. He spent a portion of his summer in Israel as part of the NFTY in Israel program. Here he offers reflections on the impact of the trip on his life.

[Rapper] A\$AP Rocky said it best, "Everything eventually becomes a memory, so make those memories worth remembering." The time has come to face the sad reality; our time in Israel is coming to an end. ## Yoga at TBE Self-Care for Body and Spirit

It all started when a few people from TBE came up to me and collectively said, "We could never do yoga." As a long-time yoga instructor, I hear these words often. When I ask why, the answers span from "I'm not flexible" to "I'm not strong enough" to "I can't relax" to "I only do exercise that gives me a workout." The irony is that each of these is exactly a reason to have a yoga practice.

Facing the group from TBE, I offered them a challenge. Attend a yoga class with me, and if after two sessions you still feel it isn't for you, I'll accept that. Between you and me, I had an ace up my sleeve. I know that after one session most people discover the amazing feeling one gets from yoga, and want to come back. Yoga can be addictive. And that is how yoga at TBE began, over three years ago.

The style of yoga at TBE is hatha, a style that is focused on compassion for oneself. Through movement and breath, it is the perfect path to letting go of the world around you, settling the mind and body, and creating space for spiritual practices such as prayer or meditation. In class, one is encouraged to connect to one's body, listen to where the sensations are, and tune in with the breath, all of which bring one closer to body and spirit.

For those who have an image of yoga classes with everyone balancing on one arm, doing shoulder stands and other crazy moves, that is not yoga at TBE. Yes, you can find classes of that kind, but in our classes we focus on more gentle moves, and modifications are offered throughout class to invite each person to make the practice comfortable in his or her own body.

In a very short time of practicing yoga, individuals often experience an increase in flexibility, mobility, balance, strength, and peacefulness. In addition, many of the poses and breath work one does in a yoga class can help relieve pain. Often, someone will walk into class with pain and after class announce that it's gone. Is it magic? No. When we take the time to care for ourselves and our bodies, the body is eager to respond.

On Thursday nights at 6:30 you can find our small group coming together for community, friendship, and a yoga practice. The environment is relaxed and allows everyone's practice to be different, as each person listens to the wisdom of his/her own body and what does or doesn't feel comfortable to do. It is a safe environment in which to play, laugh, and experiment with what a yoga practice can be.

And what about that group that approached me saying they would never be able to do yoga? Many make up the core of the group that still meets today. So, if you have ever wondered about yoga, or you are interested in a way to honor and accept your body and support your self-care, join us for a class. You'll be welcomed with stretched-out arms.

#### **Jewish Views on Yoga**

Maintaining a healthy and sound body is among the ways of God—for one cannot understand or have any knowledge of the Creator, if one is unwell.

-Maimonides

Judaism teaches that attending to body, mind, and spirit is essential to living a balanced life. Here's a beautiful explanation of how yoga and Judaism together can be paths to the soul:

#### Not Answering the Phone for an Hour

Once, while traveling in India, a friend of mine, Ruti Soudack, asked an Indian yoga teacher, "What are we trying to accomplish by doing yoga?" To her great surprise, the teacher did not say, "We are learning to find the divine within, the holy light, great love." She answered, "We are learning how not to answer the phone for an hour."

What does it mean not to answer the phone for an hour? What does this have to do with yoga? Yoga is a practice of focusing your attention and learning not to be distracted. Distractions can come from inside as well as from outside you. Your own busy thoughts—the list of things you need to get done, the problems you are trying to resolve with your eager, active mind—are all akin to a ringing phone.

You cannot stop the phone from ringing, any more than you can stop your mind from whirring. You can, however, hear the phone and not respond to it. You can notice your thoughts and let them go. You can learn not to answer all the urgent clamoring calls and to turn your attention instead to other dimensions of existence.

The Indian teacher did not say that yoga teaches you never to answer the phone. Yoga is not about disconnection from others. She is saying that yoga is a reminder to take some time to connect and be with yourself.

The Torah teaches that human beings are made in the image of God. Because you are created in the image of God, learning to be with yourself—learning not to answer the phone for an hour—is a great spiritual experience.

When you do yoga, let all the phones ring. You can attend to them later. Yoga is an opportunity to attend to yourself. It is a time to answer a different call, the call of your own soul.

#### A Collaborative Effort

With the regular services about to begin and the High Holy Days just around the corner, the members of the Ritual Committee have been working with the temple's clergy and professional staff, and with other committees, to prepare for the arrival of 5777. Ushers, greeters, parking, tickets, seating arrangements, security, sound system, silver polishing, special Torah covers, park permits (for tashlich), etc., these are the crucial nuts and bolts that, of course, are taken care of by the staff and by experienced members like Ed Tolman, Jim Lavranchuk, Jodi Siegal, and Caren Bateman. Rabbi Gluck and Cantor Pincus have brought fresh insights and ideas to their review of the worship services for the *Yomim Norim*.

This year, for example, Selichot Services will include clergy and members of Temple Sholom and the Flemington Jewish Community Center. The Ritual Committee has often discussed ways to broaden our worship to include other elements of the Jewish community; Rabbi Gluck offered us a great way to effect that enhanced sense of Jewish community in preparing for our Selichot worship. Further, the Committee had discussed ways to deepen the Yom Kippur worship by using new resources. Rabbi Gluck drew on our Committee's deliberations to fashion a new Yom Kippur afternoon service using *Mishkan HaNefesh*, the CCAR's new prayer book for the High Holy Days.

Ritual isn't the only committee or organization actively involved in all this. The Brotherhood makes the parking arrangements, Sisterhood leads the break-the-fast and Social Action Committee handles the High Holy Day food drive. In fact, most of the accomplishments and fellowship experienced at Temple Beth-El come from work on the committees. The Ritual Committee, in particular, gives its members the opportunity to serve the temple by helping to shape our worship, by working closely with the rabbi, the cantor and Executive Director Amy Rubin, by gathering monthly to review the mechanics of the Ritual calendar and to consider the meaningfulness and relevance of our worship.

Training will include both guidance on how best to support and interact with guests to truly make a difference in their lives, as well as the nuts and bolts of how we make hosting work in our building to keep our congregational home secure, avoid stepping on the toes of other temple users, and minimize the burden on our already hard-working custodial staff.

Sisterhood will again be running a one-day rummage collection to benefit the Big Brothers/Big Sisters organization, and also a household items collection to benefit the Giving Network. Keep checking the temple e-letter for a list of desired items. Brotherhood is planning to spearhead the effort of helping out at Foodbank of Somerset County.

Our Mitzvah Month activities begin on October 30 with a breakfast cohosted with Brotherhood and focused

on political dialogue in this election season. We have invited a bi-partisan panel of all three state legislative representatives for our district and look forward to a lively discussion around issues of local concern and ways to improve cooperation across the aisle in Trenton. We have also signed on with the URJ's Nitzavim initiative to address racial justice issues around voter suppression.
